Then we will study Henry<br>James' experimental novella Daisy Miller, and the naturalistic poetry by Stephen<br>Crane. The traditional poetry by Edwin Arlington Robinson and Robert will be<br>studied in a comparative approach while the modernist poetry by T. S. Eliot will<br>conclude the course. |
