Course Introduction

This course will examine and study the historical, cultural and literary backgrounds and styles of English writers mainly from the 16th to 18th centuries. We will study major works such as the great falk epic Beowulf, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight, and Canterbury Tales, etc. Students are expected to attend all classes, do all the homework, participate in class discussions, and actively answer questions.
