Course Introduction	<p>This course introduces the study of political life by providing an overview of a discipline described variously as Political Studies, Political Science, Government, or Politics. We will also examine essential concepts such as Governments and Governing, Political system, Regime, Political Ideologies, Democracy, and Political Parties. Since politics affect almost everything we do, the purpose of the course is equally broad: from exposing you to the socio-political world around us, to helping you clarify your own political beliefs and attitudes.</p>
