## Course Introduction

The focus of this course is to analyze the rise of China as an economic power house. Emphasis will be placed on understanding China's role and its subsequent impacts on the global political economy in the 21st century. The course is divided into two parts. The first part deals with the various internal factors contributing to China's changing political economy since 1949. The second part focuses on the analysis of China's current external political and economic relations with special emphasis on the Asia-Pacific region in the 21st century.
