Course Introduction	<p>This is an introductory course in poetry and its poetic expressions. In this course, we will focus our attention on four major areas of research: (1) What poetry is and how it differs from other literary forms; (2) what are its expressive forms; (3) what special skills are needed to understand it, especially the literary devices, such as denotation/connotation, symbols, anaphora, figures of speech, and so on; and (4) what are the literary, social and cultural meanings. Most importantly, students in this course are expected to read, write and analyze poems.</p>
