Subjects such as law of nations, law of the international system, subjects of international law, recognition of states and governments, state responsibility, human rights, jurisdiction, dispute resolution, territory, law of the sea, international agreements, and diplomacy will be dealt with throughout the semester. Students are strongly encouraged to get familiar with reading assignments before attending classes. Students' active participation will be noted as a plus in their final grades.</p>
