Departmental Aim of Education

To be equipped with a basic knowledge of economics and political science, to develop confidence in communicating professionally and academically in English in matters related to the global political economy; to acquire the capability to conduct further research individually and collectively with others; and ultimately to prepare oneself to become professionals and leaders with a global perspective for the international arena.

Course Introduction

This course is about cooperation among actors on the international stage with particular attention given to national actors. It consists of three parts. First, it focuses on the question of cooperation in general and in international relations in particular. It demonstrates several ways to solve the problem of cooperation.

Second, it looks at cooperation within selected international organizations (IOs) from various perspectives of international relations (IR). Finally, it surveys the mechanisms and institutions that contribute to international cooperation within selected policy areas.
