Course Introduction

The course is expected to offer a comprehensive and informed analysis of the complexities of an international sale transaction by focusing on international sales of goods and the various contractual relations that arises as a result of the sale transaction.

The students will become familiar with the standard trade terms, the Convention on International Sales of Goods, 1980 and UNIDROIT Principles of International Commercial Contracts, 2004; issues relating to E-Commerce, international transportation of cargo, the various conventions affecting such transportation.
