Course
Introduction

This course aims to introduce students to a range of grammatical, syntactical, and literary elements through the methodological studies of stories and fiction. It places considerable emphasis on the students' abilities to critique and interpret those stories, to reflect on their reading, and to share and communicate their thoughts and experience. The course is independent from but complimentary too, Integrated Writing I.
