Course Introduction

This course aims to introduce students to the practical problems of academic writing. The first semester focuses on the conceptual problems of thinking critically, analytically, and interpretatively, providing a methodology of critical modes that students can apply to solving different writing problems. It focuses on the following series of rhetorical modes: description, process, comparison and contrast, cause and effect, narration, classification, and argument.
