Course Introduction

This course will help students have relatively detailed knowledge about the major personalities in Taiwan after the year 1945. It will help them know better the signiticantly figures who influenced Taiwan following the retrocession of Taiwan to China from Japan till the dramatic year 1949. Additionally, it will review the contributions made by the major personalities in Taiwan since 1949. It will evaluate the leadership of several presidents in Taiwan, ROC. It will also discuss the contributions made by important political, business leaders, and civic diplomats, scholars and artists in Taiwan.
