Course Introduction

This course will examine and study the historical, cultural and literary backgrounds and styles of English writers mainly from the 16th to 18th centuries. We will start with the renaissance poetry by representative poets such as Sir Thomas Wyatt, Edmond Spenser, Christopher Marlowe and Sir Walter Raleigh. Then we will examine William Shakespeare's famous tragedy King Lear and the Metaphysical poetry represented by John Donne, the carpe diem poetry by both Robert Herrick and Andrew Marvell, and some religious poems by George Herbert.
