## Course Introduction

The aim of this course is to provide students with the knowledge of both theories and practical case studies (mainly from the US, EU and the G20) for IPE (International Political Economy). The course consists of the following topics: global trade, global production, global capital, global finance, global development, global environmental issues, global governance, global regimes, and finally issues and challenges facing global governance in the context of the changing regional and global political economy.
