Course Introduction	<p>This course aims to enhance students' knowledge of English literature from the Anglo-Saxon period to early Renaissance. The reading list covers a variety of texts from different literary genres to familiarize students with the major literary conventions and their functions, and to increase their understanding of the social, historical, cultural, and religious background of the medieval England in which these literary works were produced.</p>
