Course Introduction	<p>The course introduces and lectures selected classical Western thinking on international relations, partly using original treatises, and puts it in the historical context. This will greatly help students to understand the evolution of thinking on international relations and the human condition in the era when such theories emerged. In addition, the course also elaborates the question to what extend such thinkers have shaped international relations and still nowadays contribute to a better understanding of our globalized era.</p>
