Course Introduction

International security occupies a central question in the broader academic discipline of international relations, yet there have been dramatic changes in scope and content of these subjects since they emerged nearly a century ago. Today, international security problems comprise not only interstate or civil war, but also weapons of mass destruction, terrorism, insurgencies, suicide bombings, cyber war, oil depletion, climate change, infecteous diseases, and economic collapse, among still other security issues. This course offers a systematic introduction to problems of international security.
