Course Introduction	<p>This course aims to provide students with a comprehensive knowledge of policy systems and the policymaking process. It begins with the issues and debates surrounding government intervention along with discussion concerning market and government failures. We will then introduce key stages of a typical policymaking process and policy analysis techniques associated with each stage. Case studies on policy issues will be introduced in class to help bring theory and practice together.</p>
