Course Introduction

(英) The focus of this course is to analyze the nature and causes of the American economic crisis and its impacts on the US, the European Union (EU) and East Asia. The course also deals with the East Asian states' responses to the global crisis, the roles of the International Monetary Fund (IMF), and the G20 in overcoming the economic crisis. The last part analyzes the rise of terrorism, the US policies of counter-terrorism and finally revolution and democracy in Northern Africa and the Middle East.
