Course Introduction	<p>This course will examine and study the historical, cultural and literary backgrounds and styles of American writers mainly in the 19th and 20th centuries. We will start with the free verse poet Walt Whitman and the recluse poetess Emily Dickinson whose poetry explores the inner life and spiritual vision. Then we will study Henry James' experimental novella Daisy Miller, and the naturalistic poetry by Stephen Crane. The traditional poetry by Edwin Arlington Robinson and Robert will be studied in a comparative approach while the modernist poetry by T. S. Eliot will conclude the course.</p>
