Course Introduction	<p>This course aims to provide students with basic knowledge of international organizations. We will start with an introduction to the theories and practices of global governance. Then we will explore the roles of various international organizations in global governance, including IGOs, NGOs, and regional organizations. Finally, we will discuss various issues that international organizations work to address in a highly globalized world, ranging from security, economics, human rights, to the environment.</p>
