Academic Aim of Education

The educational goal of this unit of study is to help all TKU undergraduate students develop a foundational outlook on the world. It aims to help them develop a global perspective, and to equip them with the capacity to constantly strengthen their grasp.

Course Introduction

This course focuses on non-state actors in international politics. We will begin with the historical context of contemporary international relations, and then explore main international relations theories. In addition, we will discuss the roles and functions of international non-governmental organizations (INGOs). The focus is on the debates regarding the following topics: What are INGOs? What role and status do INGOs play in global civil society? Does INGOs have an impact on international relations between states? Do INGOs influence local politics within states?
