Course Introduction	<p>The course is designed to help students understand Taiwan's political development over the past 60 years of experience. Analysis from the perspective of liberalization and democratization in two facing cuts. On the one hand, this course is a longitudinal analysis, for the students to describe the important historical events; on the other hand, this course is also a horizontal analysis to explore the impact of each major event on Taiwan's democratization and liberalization.</p>
