Course Introduction	<p>This graduate seminar is on pragmatics and semiotics in language teaching and learning. The course specifically focuses on the application of pragmatics and semiotics to language teaching and learning, and on how to teach socially and culturally appropriate language for effective communication. From the pragmatics perspective, this course offers both theoretical approach to pragmatics and practical advice to teachers with hands-on classroom tasks. It aims to close the gap between what research in pragmatics has found and how language is generally taught today.</p>
