Course Introduction

Then we will explore the roles that various relevant economic actors, i.e. central and local governments, state-owned enterprises, private firms, township and village enterprises, multinational corporations, banks, workers, and consumers play in China's economic growth. Finally, we will discuss the impacts that China's economic development on China's politics, society, environment, and the world.
