Course Introduction

This course focuses on "non-state actors" in international politics. We will explore the role and function of international non-governmental organizations (INGOs). The focus is on the discussion regarding the following topics: What are INGOs? What role and status do INGOs play in global civil society? Does INGOs have an impact on international relations between states? Do INGOs influence local politics within states? What are the relations between Southern and Northern NGOs?
