## Course Introduction

The purpose of this course is to help students examine the fundamental working principles of international organizations since its inception. Efforts will be made to review the early stages of the development of international organizations. The creation and defunct of the League of Nations will be critical for students to comprehend the difficulty and dilemma regarding the efficacy of an international organizations. Special attention will be devoted to the issues surrounding the United Nations.
