Course Introduction

The course introduces students to the English academic writing style commonly accepted worldwide. We will look at it from several levels: vocabulary, sentence structure, flow/coherence of texts, and the overall organization of research writing, such as thematic progression. Students will learn the differences in various genres within academic writing and the registers that are available to such practices. For this purpose, they will be required to read a considerable amount of journal and book articles so as to build up a corpus for analysis. The class adopts a process-writing model.
