Course Introduction	<p>This course attempts to inculcate skills that are useful for reading financial related articles. These skills, however, are more than merely useful—they are necessary—for the reading of great articles, those that are of enduring interest and importance. Although one can read books, magazines, and newspapers of transient interest without these skills, the possession of them enables the student to read even the transient with greater speed, precision, and discrimination.</p>
