Course Introduction	<p>This course aims to build relations between two media, film and literature, studying works linked across the two media by genre, theme, and style. It includes many sessions of film viewing and group discussions. It will discuss the filmed adaptations with some merit of literary fiction, or on the contrary, some literary works which use techniques of presentation employed by the film. The discussion helps students know how to "see" and "appreciate" major works of cinema and of literary fiction, the differences and similarities of their narrative techniques to tell and write a story.</p>
