Course Introduction	<p>This course is designed to accommodate the needs of freshmen majoring in various disciplines. Its main aim is to teach students the basic Chinese classical texts in English, with a focus on writing and speaking abilities. The training in this course will enable them to express their knowledge in Chinese classics using English whether in a written form or in a conversation. This type of knowledge is a prerequisite to presenting the Chinese culture in a broader sense and in various environments.</p>
