## Course Introduction

The course will begin from the Enlightenment and the French Revolution, where the basic values of the modern world, including rationalism and liberalism, were proposed. During the first semester, various topics will be discussed, including capitalism, socialism, and conservatism. The second semester will focus on nationalism, imperialism and World War I.
