Course Introduction	<p>The course 'special subject on international law' aims to introduce central issues in contemporary public international law. Rather, the course's overarching objective is to examine legal subjects (particularly in the context of the use of force and human rights) in order to enhance students' understanding of how politics and law interact in shaping international relations.</p>

- III. Psychomotor: Emphasis upon the study of the course's physical activity and technical manipulation.
