Course Introduction	<p>This course introduces: 1. the political processes that have shaped the Cross-Strait relations, emphasising on recent developments. 2. the increasing economic integration across the Strait. 3. the role of the U.S. in the relationship. The course also explores the rapid rise of PRC and its implications for Cross-Strait relations. While it is perceived as challenges and threats, Taiwanese public opinions toward the PRC will be discussed. Cases of negotiations between both sides will be introduced.</p>

- III. Psychomotor: Emphasis upon the study of the course's physical activity and technical manipulation.
