Course Introduction

This course provides an overview of news analysis as a research field and an approach to international issues and affairs. Specifically, we will examine two important aspects of news content and structure: framing and transframing. For each, we will draw on daily breaking news from English sources on multiple platforms to illustrate relevant concepts, theories, and models. By the end of the term, you will learn to understand and analyze international English news through a critical lens. We will run the course in both English and Chinese.
