**Course Introduction**

This course aims to introduce the derivatives markets. The topics will include futures, forwards, options, hedging and value at risk. The course focuses on understanding how firms manage interest rate risk, exchange rate risk, and commodity price risk using these derivatives. At the end of the course, students are expected to have an essential ability to elaborate on the functions of derivatives and be able to fully understand how derivatives can help investors diversify their investment portfolio.
