Introduction**

In the scope of public policy, this course serves as a fundamental basis to understand globalisation. Broadly, the course discusses the major issues brought forward by globalisation. Specific topics include: global financial governance and responses to the global economic crisis; global production and the post-war trading regime; the cultural homogeneity and westernisation; cyberpolitics and civil society; environmental governance;poverty;and anti-globalisation.
