Course Introduction	<p>This introductory course combines theoretical and empirical content, as it seeks to feed students with insights and skills to analyze international politics. First, we will begin by laying down the theoretical foundation for the study of international relations. Second, we will explore several questions, problems, and puzzles in the study of world politics and international relations. Finally, through class debates, we will actively engage with important contemporary themes that are not only linked to international politics in academic terms, but might also have a direct impact on many of us.</p>
