Course Introduction	<p>The main purpose of the course is to introduce Taiwan's political system. It starts with explaining the process of formulating the constitution of the Republic of China, then introduces Taiwan's administrative, legislative and electoral systems in sequence. It also introduces Taiwan's democratization process and major political parties, and finally touches on the impact of Taiwan's internal politics on cross-Strait relations, students are expected to have a comprehensive understanding of the content and impact of Taiwan's political system.</p>
