Course Introduction	Interest in international law has increased dramatically over the past decades, largely because of its central place in discussions such as China's claims in the South China Sea, the Iraq War and Guantanamo, international trade & investment, environmental regimes and climate change, and the apparent failure of the international system to deal with the situations in Palestine and Darfur, and the plights of refugees and illegal immigrants around the world. This Introduction explains what international law is, its role in international society, and how it operates.
