Course Introduction

This course aims to instruct students to appreciate the beauty of each city in specific periods from different poets' perspectives. It will cover three global metropolises, New York, Paris, Hong Kong, and London, alongside three minor cities in Taiwan: Chiayi, Pingtung, and Taipei. Selected poems dedicated to each city will be read, accompanied by relevant essays and even short stories to enhance students' understanding of poets' emotions when writing the poem. Students will utilize a website to create a blog and compose poems about the cities that hold personal significance to them.
