Course Introduction

To begin, we will review the core theoretical perspectives (or "paradigms") of IR and the historical origins of the existing international order. We will then proceed to survey major concepts, models, and theories of IR. On this basis, we will finally explore cutting-edge international issues with a focus on the Asia-Pacific.
