Course Introduction	This course focuses on the mechanism and institution of Russian politics. Besides briefly introducing the Tsar's tradition and Soviet legacy, this course mainly illustrates the political institution and the excising of power in President Putin's administration. Furthermore, as a result of the severe influences of oligarchs in Russian Politics, an introduction to Russian Oligarchs is also included.
