Course Introduction	<p>The overarching goal of the Seminar is combining theoretical, empirical, and practical content to feed students with insights and skills to analyze international politics. As such, it is divided into three parts. First, we begin by laying down the theoretical foundation for the study of international relations. Second, we will explore several questions, problems, and puzzles in the study of world politics and international relations. Finally, through guest lectures and workshops, we will examine various issues that are linked to international politics in both academic and professional terms.</p>
