Course Introduction	<p>Sociology of Development used to play a significant role in the State's industrial development before the 1980s. However, since neoliberalism turned, market-led growth has become the dominant approach, and a global approach to development has emerged. Additionally, there is a growing debate on the World System and World Society. Meanwhile, scholars are examining the impact of market-led growth on individuals and societies, which has led to a more society-centered approach. The course aims to provide an understanding of development from sociological and interdisciplinary perspectives.</p>
