Course Introduction

This course introduces you to the study of international relations (IR). You will learn various approaches to understanding and explaining how political and economic forces shape the future of the international system. To begin, we will review the core theoretical perspectives (or "paradigms") of IR and the historical origins of the existing international order. We will then proceed to survey major concepts, models, and theories of IR. On this basis, we will finally explore cutting-edge international issues with a focus on the Asia-Pacific. This course will use generative AI as a teaching aid.
