Course Introduction

This graduate seminar explores the shifting contours of "Global Anglophone Literatures," moving beyond traditional postcolonial frameworks to examine how contemporary texts negotiate the complexities of a globalized world. We will analyze how literature written in English from diverse geographical origins—India, the United States, and the allegorical "nowhere" of Coetzee's late fiction—grapples with transnational flows of capital, bodies, and ideas.
